Stop Press. Since 'The News', was published last week, heavy snow has fallen, cancelling week-end sport and completely cutting off road transport and marooning some staff at out-of-the-way places. Conditions were still not at their best when, on the sixth day of Dr. Barbara Moore's trek from John O'Groats to Lands End, a small expedition of Harwell and Aldermaston pioneers set off at 1400 hours to cover a route 164 miles north. The 'AERE News' went too - weighed down with camera, sketch pad and other personal effects - so that this report could be made available to readers.

The most hazardous part of the journey came after the first seven miles, necessitating inch by inch navigation through icy slush with the greatest danger and difficulty. This was for the distance from the Guard Room to the main runway of Abingdon Aerodrome. From there in the Heron aircraft that took off at 1430 it was plain sailing. As the party sped overland, road-weary travellers were seen groping their way by the four-wheeled earth transport that is a relic of the rickshaw days. Touch-down was in less than an hour at Ringway (Manchester), 164 road-miles away.

The New Service. This flight described was a proving flight to check final details of the daily air service for the Authority by the swifter, more comfortable Heron:

As those of you who have used the existing service know, flight is connected by car service with U.K.A.E.A. establishments: in the north with Risley, Culcheth, Capenhurst and Warrington stations; in the south with Winfrith.

It will be seen that a whole day can be spent at the A.E.E. Winfrith between two nights at a hotel, or hostel such Durlay Hall. The plane chartered by the Authority from Jersey Airlines is available for all U.K.A.E.A. staff and attached staff, on official duties. Staff who have previously been discouraged from using the earlier flight service envisaged to use their own transport in lieu of the car service, will now need little encouragement to use the improved flight facilities. With the larger aircraft there is now less likelihood of seats not being available for charter aircraft on a particular day. Bookings can be made through your D.A.O.

As prophesised on this page earlier in the month, the rickshaw/air-balloon days of travel are past. From next Monday, the 25th January, the trouble will be taken out of travel with the inauguration of the Heron service that can give a flying start to outside duties.

Letters to the Editor

Dear Sir,

Regularly throughout the year the Press, Radio and Television covering the whole of the British Isles put out articles and programmes on Welsh, Scotch and Irish Patron Saints and Poets. At the time of writing Burns Night is upon us again and I can presume fairly reasonably that I shall hear Welsh announcers trying to say "Burns Nicht" with a Scotch accent.

My big complaint is that the English press and radio carry all these peculiar pagan rites in spite of the fact that Scotland, Wales and Ireland have their own newspapers and radio and television Regions. Why can't they put out their own National Programmes without foisting them on the English as well?

I realise, of course, that Wales, Scotland and Ireland must be pretty terrible countries to live in judging by the number of Welsh, Scots and Irish who manage to invade England for jobs but I do not consider this is any reason why we should have to listen to the ghastly noise of bagpipes, Irish reels or melancholy Welsh choirs.

Again, why Burns' Night? Have the Scotch only one poet worth celebrating? And was the language in which he wrote most of his poems a vain attempt at a national tongue?

Why don't we English give all these races a real treat: let us make St. George's Day a live date on the calendar and thump home to them what a truly magnificent country England is: let us have a Shakespeare's Night to laud the greatest poet who ever lived, a poet who made a song out of a language: let us have a Tennyson's Night, a Longfellow's Night - but then there aren't enough nights in the year and even Burns Night would have to go by the board in favour possibly of some lesser English poet who would still be greater than Burns!

BURNS' NIGHT

"O wad some power the giftie gie us,
To see oursel as other see us."



It has been said that Shakespeare's personality is enigmatically concealed in his works. That is not so with Burns. Since his death in 1796 his life and work have been the source of an unceasing stream of biographies, essays and biographical novels. The writers have sought, not always with impartial judgment, to assess his place in the literature of our land. Some in moods of fervent admiration have placed him on the topmost pinnacle. Others, like Matthew Arnold, have dismissed him impatiently, dubbing him a drunken ploughman whose verses in the dialect are not worthy of serious consideration. Goethe pronounced him first of the lyricists in virtue of the two hundred and fifty songs which he wrote or rescued from rags, squalor and indecency to adorn and transfigure. Wherever the truth may lie, and Burns himself had no high hopes of achieving immortality, there is no doubt that he stands supreme in the affection of Scots folk the world o'er.
