Appleton-Rutherford Merger

The merger of the SRC's Appleton and Rutherford Laboratories took effect from 1 September 1979.

The combined experience and expertise of the two Laboratories will provide a strong focus for the support of space research in the UK, and form a basis on which to strengthen and extend existing work in the cations field.

New Appointments

Dr G H Stafford, as Director General, has overall responsibility for the combined Laboratories with Dr G Manning and Professor J T Houghton as Director Rutherford and Director Appleton, respectively. Dr J M Valentine is the Secretary of the Rutherford and Appleton Laboratories.

The Divisions

There are 10 Rutherford Divisions, including the new "Computing" Division (headed by Prof F R A Hopgood) which combines the former Atlas Computing Division and Computing and Automation Dion. Appleton has 2 Divisions fr 1 September: the Space and 1 September: the Space and Astrophysics Division (headed by Dr A H Gabriel) and the Geophysics and Radio Division (headed by the Director Appleton).

Chilton Arrivals

Already some tangible evidence of the merger can be seen on the Chilton site. The Infra-Red Astronomical Satellite project (IRAS) - described in Bulletin 11 - is well under way with the construction of the antenna near R58. The computing and tracking equipment for this project is installed in the R1 Control Centre. Some staff on the IRAS project transferred to Chilton on 1 September, and the remainder will join us early in the New Year. They have their office accommodation in R32 and R16. mysterious arrival of a "ship's boiler" in R7 was recently revealed (see Bulletin 17) to be an untuned cavity for measurement of the absorption of millimetre waves - yet another new project to arrive at Chilton.

The new buildings at the rear of R25 will provide offices and laboratories for transferring staff, and further extensions to R25 have been approved.

Merger Organisation

The intention is to transfer the work and staff from Ditton Park and Culham progressively to the Chilton Site over the next two to three years. timetable for this should be finalised by the end of the year.

A Merger Unit has been set up under Mr P S Maxwell to deal with matters arising from the merger including the provision of assistance to staff with their transfers. Mr M Snowden has responsibility for the technical aspects of the merger.

A Merger Working Party has been formed, chaired by the Director General and with representatives from the Staff and Trade Union Sides of both sites plus a representative from the Establishment Division of Central Office and the Central Staff Side Officers, to enable Management and

Staff to discuss all aspects of the merger before decisions are taken. Some of the items currently under discussion are: the programme for the transfer of work, housing and other staff matters such as Conditions of Transfer, Redundancy Terms and the possible retention of flexible working hours by existing Ditton Park

Master of St. Cross

We are pleased to report the appointment of Dr G H Stafford, CBE, FRS, to the Mastership of St Cross College, Oxford, from 1 October 1979. This will be a part-time appointment and Dr Stafford will remain Director General of the combined Rutherford and Appleton Laboratories.

St Cross is a graduate College founded by the University in 1965, where men and women may be admitted to read for advanced degrees and diplomas of the University. The College has 55 Fellows and about 20 post graduates.

Dr Stafford will be the second Master of St Cross.

Rutherford Laboratory Lecture

"Current Questions on Nuclear Power" by J G Collier, Atomic Energy Technical Unit, Harwell.

An examination of various future energy scenarios - both "conventional" and "low-energy" futures - indicates a substantial need in the United Kingdom for electricity from nuclear power. It seems likely that the nuclear capacity in the year 2000 will be made up primarily of a mix of AGRs and PWRs with perhaps one or two fast reactor stations.

On present plans, all the known reserves of uranium will have been committed by the turn of the century. The fast reactor provides the United Kingdom with the option of becoming independent of imported fuels, including uranium, early in the next century.

Public acceptability is a growing problem. Apart from non-proliferation and radioactive waste disposal, there is public concern about nuclear safety, the effects of low level radiation and plutonium economy.

Irrespective of its current difficulties, the shortage of fossil fuels fairly well ensures that nuclear power must provide a significant contribution to our future power needs.

Staff planning overseas visits are therefore requested to establish a need for smallpox vaccination and where this exists, to make arrangements well in advance with the Medical Department, AERE (Ext. 4156) so that a session can be arranged.

MANTIS - Does this grab you?



